MY ALARM GOES OFF ...

At 6.40am. I reach for my phone to check my emails and look at the stories of the day. Then I grab my computer to go over the questions for the games I'll be hosting that day. Only when I'm caught up do I get out of bed. I choose my outfit from a rack my stylist puts together in my lounge - I usually pick a bright dress. Then I jump into a car and go to the studio.

I'M RESPONSIBLE FOR...

Presenting the British version of the gameshow app HQ. I ask 12 questions and the audience has 10 seconds to answer each of them. They can win hundreds of thousands of pounds. I'm also responsible for interacting with the audience live and making it fun. It has to be enjoyable to play.

I GOT THE JOB ...

By auditioning. I was working as a presenter on BBC America when my agent called me about the audition. I thought, 'OK, that sounds fun, I could do that. I auditioned and just forgot about it, then two months later my agent called me saying I'd got the job.

MY TYPICAL DAY ...

Sees me arrive at the studio at 8.30am. I go into hair and make-up writers and producers to discuss - we coordinate this with my outfit. If I'm in America, the first show is at 10am to broadcast in the UK at then I'll Skype them. My second 3pm. I like to know the questions inside out and be certain of the facts. This helps make my commentary entertaining. Because and grab lunch, usually a salad,

I start to feel excited a few minutes before we go live, that's when the in-app chat kicks off and I can feel our audience's energy. I also have to stay on top of the day's stories as we reference them on the show. For example, we went live just as England's World

Cup semi-final had gone into extra time, so we were glued to the TV. After I finish the first show at

10.20am, I'll have breakfast I usually eat some fruit and a croissant. Then I'll catch up with any questions I have - if I need to speak to someone in the UK team show is at 4pm in New York to broadcast at 9pm in the UK. Sometimes, I go to the gym we're live, there's a lot of ad-lib too. between shows. Other times, I prepare for the next day or do more shows for the American HQ.

> Every other week we have a meeting with founders, writers, producers and presenters to talk about the direction of the company and make sure we're all on the same page. I finish at 5.30pm.

MY MOST MEMORABLE MOMENT ...

Was when I was asked to appear on the show Empire. I played myself interviewing Jamal Lyon when his mum, Cookie, bursts into the room, It was the most surreal moment when Cookie said my name.

THE WORST PART OF MY JOB ...

Is seeing people get too invested in the game - they get so sad when they lose.

THE BEST PART OF MY JOB ...

Is seeing how excited our audience gets.

AFTER WORK...

I'm out at industry events, most nights. Otherwise, I'll meet a friend for dinner - I love Cipriani and Nobu, I'm usually home by 8.30pm and I'll catch up on emails. I tend to stay up late reading or watching TV. I try to be asleep by 12.30am.

HQ Trivia's Sharon Carpenter says she faced 'blatant racism'

Sharon Carpenter was "painfully shy" at school, too afraid to raise her hand in class even when she knew the answers.

But now the Watford schoolgirl is the one asking the questions - often to upwards of 750,000 people at a time.

The journalist and presenter - affectionately given the nickname "Shazza" by fansis the face of HQ Trivia in the UK, a free and popular quiz app where players compete to win a share of prize money.

But growing up in Watford and then Guildford in the 1980s, Carpenter - who is mixed-race, describing herself as half white, half Indian - says her confidence was affected by "blatant racism".

She recalls when she was just starting out in television, and was told by a "big client executive" that her English accent would be a "distraction" to any career onscreen.

"Coming from someone I respected so much, that hit me hard. He was dashing my hopes and it had me questioning myself."

But it was after watching Sting perform his hit Englishman in New York that she resolved not to give up.

"One of the lines is 'be yourself no matter what they say'. That was the first time I really heard those lyrics up close and personal.

"And I thought, you know what, I'm holding on to my accent."



Carpenter later met Sting - and Shaggy - when they appeared as guests on HQ Trivia



She says there is still "much more work to be done" to end discrimination.

"Although we've come a long way when it comes to race relations, we've also taken a few steps back lately."



"You're putting your personality out there for 12-15 minutes. That can be intimidating.

"I remember the first time I hosted there were about 12,000 live players in the game. I thought that was pretty staggering."

The app's popularity grew fast, and global games can attract more than a million players. It has a team of writers, but presenters ad-lib, come up with jokes and do "shout-outs" to players.

Sharon Carpenter is to the British HQ what Bradley Walsh is to *The Chase*. She hosts twice a day, a new outfit for each quiz, filling airtime - if you can call it airtime, on a phone - with the professionalism of a local news reporter who has just been told to add another two minutes to their clip on the steam railway fair. She's a safe pair of hands, not least because it looks as if she might be permanently stuck inside the app and never allowed to leave. She turns dud jokes into slightly less dud jokes and styles out any glitches.

Carpenter is a prototype for how celebrities are going to be baked in the future, beamed to our smartphones, above real-time rolling analysis of who they are and what they're wearing. It's like one of those "famous people read mean Tweets" videos that occasionally goes viral, with A-listers gamely attempting to laugh about someone calling them talentless and wishing they were dead. Only HQ has built the famous person, and built the comments section, and has us all hooked, unable to stop viddying.

Carpenter has a distinct speaking pattern - a kind of talking-while-thinking style as she fills time without a live audience reaction. Each question has three multiple-choice answers; you just have to select the right one within a 10-second time limit. They start off super-easy - "Which of these places is often referred to as 'Down Under'?" - and get harder as you progress until question 12, which is essentially a stab in the dark: once it was, "Which of these countries has the highest ratio of women to men?"

After each question, it is revealed how many people got it right. You need to answer every question correctly to stay in; by the final question there are normally fewer than 100 players left. If you get the last question right, your share of the prize is sent to your PayPal account in minutes. Depending on the day, the prize pot can be anywhere from £500 to £300,000.

The key difference between this game and every other quizshow is that everyone watching HQ is also a contestant. In the UK, a game starts with about 125,000 players, although some UK games have had as many as 270,000 join in. HQ also hosts global games, broadcast with US host Scott Rogowsky at more American-friendly times, which average about 1 million viewers, and have peaked at 2.38 million.

Even if you've not played HQ before, you might have seen it in your office or at the pub. Because everyone is playing live, there is a Black Mirrorish effect when groups play together, with everyone in thrall to their phones; Carpenter's face beams out from multiple phones placed on a table, occasionally interrupted by streaming glitches that make her appear almost bot-like, (I was playing in the toilet because it was still early days for HQ, and not yet acceptable to down tools to play. A few weeks later, the entire office seemed to stop what it was doing for 10 minutes, with answers shouted across the room.)

I've now been playing for more than six months, since the UK launch in January, so when I meet Carpenter at HQ's offices in New York, I forget she's not an old friend and wave her over to the table I'm sitting at as if we're in a pub garden. She says she often gets this: HQ lets players talk to each other and the host during the quiz, so there is an informality to the relationship. "Obviously us Brits have a very dry, sarcastic sense of humour, and they will not hesitate to lay into me. Once I was a little thirsty before I went on, so I had a mango lassi. People were calling me yellow tongue. It took a while to live that down."

Carpenter was born in the UK but moved to New York after she left school to away as prizes; the sh do a business degree. She stayed on, working as a producer on various local and financial news shows. Now she juggles a few hosting jobs with the quiz (including a red carpet gig for BBC America) and enjoys the platform HQ has given her. "My background is in journalism, and often my presenting has been pretty strait-laced. There's only so much room for jokes and that sort of dry humour. I love the fact I can really be myself."

Carpenter hasn't been back to the UK since she started working on the show and so has only heard secondhand of how Shazza mania is gripping pubs. offices and common rooms. "I was in Midtown a couple of weeks ago and out of nowhere all I hear is, 'Shazza, is that you?' I'm like, nobody in the US knows me as Shazza! This guy comes over saying he's from the UK for a couple of days quickly faced competi and we have to take a selfie."

Meet the presenter of the world's biggest quiz show - and it's not on TV

Sharon Carpenter is one of the most-watched presenters in the world, broadcasting live to a captive audience of millions each day. Her viewers love her chatty, self-deprecating manner, and the days she's not on their screens are met with laments of 'Where's Shazza?' But Carpenter isn't, as you might expect, a presenter on an international news channel (though she does a bit of that too), but on an app.

Quiz app HQ Trivia launched in the UK in January, five months after it was released in the US. The premise is simple enough – two live broadcasts each day, which players tune into for the chance to win a share of a cash prize (the amount ranges daily, but has reached the heady heights of \$250,000) if they manage to answer 12 pieces of trivia in ascending levels of difficulty. Answer the question incorrectly and it's game over. https://inews.co.uk/news/technology/hq-trivias-sharon-carpenter-pub-quizzes-im-probably-not-that-great/

The fiendish questions, coupled with a 10-second time limit and scrolling feed of user comments at the bottom of the screen, make for an exhilarating and ultimately addictive experience. The app has quickly become an international phenomenon, spawning a German version and inspiring entire offices to down tools each afternoon to play together as a bonding exercise. Games in the UK are broadcast at 15.00 and 21.00 daily and attract an average of around 150,000 players, though it can reach up to 280,000. Some US games have reached more than 2.5m participants. It's a global pub quiz.



If you think it would be tough being a live TV presenter then imagine what it's like to be the host of a live quiz app, beamed twice daily into the palms of thousands of smartphone users across the country. This is the rather strange situation that Sharon Carpenter – a British-born, NYC-based host and journalist – has found herself in since the beginning of the year, when she landed the role of full-time host for HQ Trivia's UK launch.

ad I'm taking this one home

Known to few this side of the pond prior (previous credits include stints for BBC America, BET and a bit-part cameo on *Empire*), Carpenter's latest – and most high-profile – gig sees her come face-to-face with her newfound celebrity status on a daily basis, as the app's players (known affectionately as "HQties") voice their every thought and feeling in a running chat stream below Carpenter's floating torso.



Prior to HQ, you were probably better known in America than in the UK. Have you been back to the UK since your HQ stardom?

Not since I started hosting this year, but I will be back soon. My family is still over there so I do go back a few times a year. It will be really interesting to see what it's like when I come back. This is the first time that I've consistently built up a UK audience.

Can HQ Disrupt The Gender Norms Of Traditional Game Shows?

Update: A woman is heading up HQ Trivia's UK shows. Tonight, Sharon Carpenter launched the popular trivia app abroad. She will remain the main host there, a job that has been held by Scott Rogowsky in the U.S.

This piece was originally published on December 13, 2017.

Last week, I sat in a Soho studio with Sarah Pribis and Sharon Carpenter, trying to think of female leads throughout game show history. Carpenter and Pribis are two of the regular hosts on HQ, the live trivia show app that launched in late-August and has gone viral in the past month. Off the top of our heads, we could only come up with Meredith Vieira, who

spent eleven seasons and won two Daytime Emmys for her work as the host of *Who Wants To Be A Millionaire*.

HQ said that it plans to introduce new guest hosts in addition to the regular roster, but this week, it was disappointing to see that the guest lineup was all male. If HQ truly wants to shift the paradigm, having female guest hosts, or seeing Pribis and Carpenter host more often, is a crucial way it can break with traditional game show norms.



As successful as HQ has been — getting coverage in The New York Times and New Yorker, as well as the now infamous Daily Beast piece — a lot is in flux right now. At the same time that everyone is talking about what a winner the app is, they're also asking if the its sudden success could be a bad thing. Live shows have already experienced glitches including lag times during broadcasts and "technical difficulty" delays of up to an hour. For the first time, HQ capped Sunday night's broadcast at 440,000 players, explaining to unlucky fans on Twitter, "We're focused on building for the best experience & working to fix it so anyone who wants to play is IN."

The people I've talked to about HQ are split into two camps. Those who have played are completely addicted, shutting down their lives at 3 p.m. and 9 p.m. on weekdays and 9 p.m. on weekends to tune in to the live trivia show for a shot at earning \$1,500 and, some nights, as much as \$10,000. Those who haven't played have heard of the app, but don't quite understand how it works or what all the hype is about. Still, name recognition is half the battle for any new app looking to get off the ground, and the fact that HQ has that in spades is an impressive start — and a positive thing for its female hosts.



Pribis and Carpenter aren't necessarily surprised by the app's success. They are, however, taken aback by how quickly it happened. 





And the world stops at 9pm: why millions drop everything for smartphone quiz

Imagine the intellectual and social pressure of a pub quiz - then multiply it by more than 2 million people.

Every day at 3pm and 9pm sharp, an army of teenagers, students, pensioners and office workers stop what they are doing, whip out their smartphones and launch an app to take part in a new online craze called HQ Trivia - the pub quiz brought kicking and screaming into the smartphone era.

Up to 2 million people in the US and some 200,000 playing the UK But the 51 winners in last Thus version at the same appointed hours UK game banked just £11 each.

in BST - watch a quizmaster broad-casting live from a studio in New York surrounded by colourful graphics.

The host asks a series of increasingly difficult questions in a 15-minute version of Who Wants to Be a Millionaire smashed into the Hunger Games.

There's no forgetting the game times: players - called HQties - get a notification on their phone. People play, free, all at the same time, with players eliminated for a wrong answer.

The prize pot for answering the 12 multiple choice questions correctly can range from £500 to £200,000 or more, to be shared among winners. But the 51 winners in last Thursday's

answer each question within 10 seconds. That means the answers can't be Googled. There are also distractions - a constant stream of inane chat from the app's hundreds of thousands of viewers which streams across the bottom of the screen, and "shout-outs", birthday wishes and other mentions blurted out by the host between questions.

The game, available for Android and iPhone, is the brainchild of Rus Yusupov and Colin Kroll - who previously founded Vine, a six-second video-sharing app bought by Twitter for \$30m (£22m) and since axed.

It is currently burning through \$15m of capital venture money provided by Lightspeed Venture Partners, which was an early investor in Snapchat, and an investment fund set up by PayPal's founder, Peter Thiel.

The app launched in the US in August 2017 and is hosted by the US comedian Scott Rogowsky, who has gained cult status as the "quiz daddy".

The UK version is hosted by the

British-born, New York-based Sharon Carpenter. It was launched in January and now has hundreds of thousands of players. Carpenter answers in her couldn't-be-more-British daytime TV manner and delivers snippets of extra trivia between questions.
